Choose a catheter that is compatible for your travel plans, lifestyle, and activities.

For example, if you'll be traveling with others, you may want a compact catheter that you can discreetly carry.



Prioritize comfort and ease of use.

You'll want a catheter that is comfortable for you and easy to open, insert, and remove. A pre-lubricated or hydrophilic catheter may offer a smoother experience, while a closed system catheter can provide a hygienic disposal option.



Remember to talk to your prescribing healthcare professional.

Before you set off on your travels, talk to your doctor. They may have recommendations based on your individual needs and medical history.

Travel Catheter Options

When you're traveling, there are a few things to consider: your privacy, how easily you can pack and carry your supplies, and how hygienic your catheter is to use on the go or in public restrooms. 180 Medical offers a wide variety of options from all brands and types.

Uncoated straight catheters

Female length straight catheters are usually around 6 to 8 inches, which makes them easy to pack and carry discreetly with lubricating jelly packets. Male length catheters are longer (16 inches) but some options come in discreet packaging, such as the U-shaped Cure Catheter.

Pre-lubricated or hydrophilic catheters

These travel-friendly catheters come in compact designs to maintain your privacy when you're on the go. Prelubricated catheters come ready-to-use, while hydrophilic catheter options activate within seconds, providing a smooth, hassle-free experience.

Closed system catheters

For the ultimate in travel convenience, closed system catheter kits feature an all-in-one touch-free design with an integrated collection bag and insertion supplies, making catheterization in public restroom or limited access areas a breeze.

Please note: Not all insurance carriers will cover advanced products like closed system or hydrophilic catheters. To find out your insurance plan's catheter coverage, reach out to 180 Medical.









Preparing for Your Trip



Now that you're ready to start planning, it's a good idea to sit down with a travel checklist and calculate how many catheters and supplies you'll need to pack for your trip.

Your travel preparations will depend on a few things:



Where you're travelling
Your method of travel (airplane, car, etc.)
How long you'll be away from home

Calculate Your Supply Needs

The last thing you want on a vacation is to run out of catheters. Although 180 Medical may be able to help you out in a pinch, it's a good idea to plan in advance for how many catheters you'll need to pack.

How many times per day do you catheterize on average? Multiply that by the number of days you'll be away from home. For example, if you typically use 4 catheters per day, and you'll be away for 10 days, then you should pack 40 catheters at minimum. Be sure to include all the supplies you regularly use, including lubricating jelly packets, disposable gloves, disinfecting wipes, etc.

And don't forget to pack extras (at least a few more days worth) in your carry-on bag in case of emergencies.

Flying? Know the TSA Guidelines Before Your Trip

If you're traveling by airplane, be prepared for the TSA (Transportation Security Administration) security lines, but don't worry. Plenty of people who use catheters fly on planes every day with no problems. With some advance planning, you'll be ready to take to the skies.

Bring a Travel Card

To expedite your security screening, carry a medical note or use the included travel card in this guide to communicate the medical necessity of your supplies.

2 Organize Your Supplies

Pack your catheter supplies in a dedicated compartment or pouch in your carry-on bag for easy access and inspection by a TSA officer.



Place liquids like lubricating jelly or hydrophilic catheters with included water sachets in a transparent, resealable quartsized bag for screening.

4 Inform About Your Needs

Talk to the TSA officer about your medical supplies and any other special considerations or assistance you may need for a smoother experience.

A Few More Quick Tips to Prepare for Your Trip

If you're traveling to a new destination or if you require special accommodations, make a plan in advance with these suggestions.

DO YOUR RESEARCH



Get familiar with the location of accessible public restrooms, hospitals, and pharmacies near your accommodations and planned activity sites.

MAKE AN EMERGENCY CONTACTS LIST

Include your doctor and any other important contacts on a written list in case of an emergency.



CARRY YOUR CATHETERS WITH YOU

If you need to catheterize multiple times per day, be sure to bring along your supplies wherever you go during your daytime outings.

CONSIDER YOUR ACCOMMODATIONS

When booking your hotel or rental, be sure to request an accessible room if needed and ask about options to make your stay comfortable, such as a roll-in shower for a wheelchair.

Be sure to check travel advisories before booking a trip to an unfamiliar destination. Check out online forums and blogs to see what the locals say about safe and interesting places to sight-see, eat, shop, and more.

Top 5 Tips for Keeping Catheters Discreet

Whether you're at a hotel, at a friend's house, or using a public restroom, you may wonder about the challenges of keeping your catheters usage private while away from home.

Here are a few tips to maintain discretion and comfort while traveling with catheters.

Seek out public restrooms with accessible stalls so you have enough space to use your supplies comfortably.

Use an opaque bag for discreet disposal of used catheter supplies. A brown paper bag or small plastic trash bag should work well.

> Carry your supplies discreetly by choosing a stylish messenger bag, backpack, tote, or briefcase.



Will you be camping away from easily accessible restrooms? Try a portable pop-up privacy tent and use an attachable urine collection bag or closed system catheter.

> Choose a discreet travel-sized catheter that you can easily pocket or carry privately during the day.



Keeping It Clean & Maintaining Good Hygiene



When traveling with catheter supplies, it's essential to maintain good hygiene to prevent urinary tract infections (UTIs) and other complications. However, it can be more challenging when you're away from the comfort of your own home. In this section, we'll explore some tips and tricks for maintaining proper hygiene.

You may have to make some adjustments to your day-to-day schedule while traveling, but setting a reminder can help you remember when it's time to cath and find a private spot or public restroom.

4 Easy Tips for Catheter Hygiene On the Go

Here are some tips that may help you maintain a more hygienic cathing environment, no matter where you go.



Practice lubricating your straight catheter without directly touching the tube.

180 Medical customer Anthony says, "When lubing the catheter, I cut both ends of the lube packet, then I push the catheter through it and pull it back to get an even coating."

Use a closed system catheter with insertion supplies like gloves and disinfecting wipes.

Steve, 180 Medical Patient Advocate, frequently travels, and he says that he prefers closed system catheters because "they ensure that your hands and external surfaces won't touch the part of the catheter that you insert into the bladder."





Choose a catheter designed to reduce the risk of infection from hand contamination.

A no-touch catheter with a guide sleeve or a self-contained closed system catheter may provide the best protection from hand contamination. Talk to 180 Medical about your options based on your insurance coverage.

Keep your hands clean before/after catheterization.

If you don't have access to a clean sink with soap and water, you can use hand sanitizer or carry some additional supplies. Richard, a 180 Medical customer, shares, "I keep clean water, soap, hand sanitizer, and gloves in a small tub in my car."

Travel Communication Card

This travel card is provided to travelers to help simplify communication with security at times when you need to let them know about your catheter supplies. Keep in mind that this is not a pass to avoid security screening. You may want to include a signed Medical Validation Certificate from your doctor if traveling overseas. However, this should help communicate your medical supply needs in a non-verbal way to airport security to maintain your privacy and discretion.

TSA NOTIFICATION CARD: Medical Condition Requiring the Use of Catheter Supplies

I require the use of catheter supplies due to the following disability or medical condition:

I understand that presenting this card does not exempt me from screening. I will need these supplies onboard the plane in order to drain my bladder.

Restroom Communication Card

Usually, you should have no problems accessing the restroom while onboard your flight. However, this card may help in the event that there is limited restroom access. You may wish to show this to a flight attendant so they understand your needs ahead of time. On the other side of the card, you'll find 180 Medical's contact information in case you have a supply emergency.
